ber 20, at the direction of Hornsby Alderman Wayne Isbell, was posted as starting at 7:00 p.m.

Hedwall said special called meetings must be agreed upon by the board.

"One person of the Board can not demand a special meeting," she said in a statement, adding, "Especially when this individual says to meet at 6:00 p.m, but then puts in the local paper that the meeting starts an hour later at 7:00 p.m."

The meeting would have been the fourth in fifteen days, following meetings on October 4, where the the aldermen were informed they needed to find an engineer, appoint a grant administrator, and approve a resolution to get the ball rolling and a special called meeting on October 7, where they approved the first reading of the resolution, under protest from Hedwall.

"Adequate notice had not been given to the public in order to have the meeting," she said, adding that "The board unanimously overruled me and proceeded to accept the first reading and approval of the resolution."

The next meeting, called for October 17, saw the board unanimously pass the resolution on the second reading and vote to hire TLM as the engineer for the project accepting \$592,000 from the State of Tennessee but not without a warning from Hedwall.

"We will have to take on debt and borrow or raise water rates," she cautioned prior to the vote to not only pass the resolution but to hire TLM as the engineer for the project.

Minutes of the meeting on October 17 have no mention of the board voting to have the October 20 meeting, while the minutes from the October 7 meeting do have the special called meeting on the 17th recorded as voted on and approved.

Hedwall's social media post on October 25 said that she had contacted the state about the situation.

"Per Nashville, everything I told the Board was correct. They will be issuing a letter of reprimand to the Hornsby Board of Aldermen and they further stated that this could end up in Chancery Court."

The deadline for Hornsby to complete their application to receive the grant is November 1, although grant money will not need to be spent until December of 2026. If they accept the grant, the Town of Hornsby would need to have a maximum of a 15% match and fund the projects on the front end with the state reimbursing them after completion. Also, the town would be responsible for the depreciation of the project over twenty years. The next meeting of the Hornsby Board of Aldermen is scheduled for November 1.

through that wall that I couldn't get through."

Rukiyah, who went on to graduate from Bolivar and is now attending college, agreed. "She was always the one I could count on," she said of Hoyle. "When I felt like that I was about to get in trouble, I was about to do something bad, she'd let me come sit in her class, and calm down."

Hoyle maintains a food, hygiene, and clothing closet for her students and families to provide them with basic needs supplies. She persuaded several local donors to donate a refrigerator and freezer so she could store healthier food options for students and families; one local restaurant owner was so impressed with Hoyle's program that she now donates a portion of the restaurant's profits every month as well.

During the pandemic, she partnered with the UT Extension office to obtain food boxes for her families and personally delivered them to families who could not meet at the drop-off time. When the pandemic revealed some students were without internet, she tirelessly copied work packets and delivered them to the students with transportation needs.

"Ms. Hoyle always goes above and beyond for the students at BCHS," said Dr. Christy Smith, Director of Schools for Hardeman County. "We are proud to have her with us."

Sherry and CIS of Tennessee are in their fourth year of working with Bolivar Central High School through a pilot program developed in partnership with Governor Bill Lee and the Tennessee General Assembly. Last spring, the Tennessee General Assembly approved \$3 million for CIS of Tennessee to continue its pilot for two more years. In total, the pilot serves 11,500 students at 23 high schools across 15 rural counties.
